Legislative Update

Nebraska Legislative Activity

Current Nebraska legislative activity and updates to the following proposed bills can be found at <http://www.unicam.state.ne.us/>.

- ***Proposal to Create a Statewide Immunization Registry (LB949)***

The purpose of LB949 is to provide public and private immunization providers with the ability to track records on both children and adults. The registry would be assigned to the state Department of Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure, which will submit a plan to the Governor and Legislature by December 1, 2006. Costs for administration of the registry would not come from state general funds.

The bill is sponsored by Senator Jim Jensen of Omaha and was first inspired by the success of the Louisiana statewide registry after Hurricane Katrina. Immunization records were easily accessible for displaced children enrolling in different schools after the storm. Currently school nurses in Nebraska spend a substantial amount of time retrieving immunization records for students. A statewide immunization registry would also provide the ability for people needing vaccinations to be found and notified in the case of an epidemic. Nebraska currently has two immunization registries, but contains records for only 20 to 30% of children in the state, is only available to public providers and has not been modernized over the years. The bill was placed on General File on February 7, 2006.

The Nebraska Immunization Registry Coalition (NE-IRC), a group of interested healthcare providers and professionals, has been formed to advocate for the bill and assist in the development of a strategic plan for the registry. - ***Proposal for Long-term care Insurance Program (LB854)***

Under LB854 a long-term care partnership program would be established and administered by the state Department of Health and Human

Services Finance and Support. The bill, sponsored by Sen. Doug Cunningham of Wausa, allows for an individual to protect their assets and qualify for Medicaid upon exhaustion of benefits under a long-term care partnership program policy. The bill's purpose is to encourage planning for long-term health and discourage the practice of "spending down" to qualify for Medicaid. - ***Proposal to Promote Awareness of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome and Shaken Baby Syndrome (LB1088)***

LB1088 would require that every medical facility provides standardized information in print and/or video to all parents of a newborn child before discharge from the facility. The bill was placed on General File on February 2, 2006.

- ***Proposal to Collect Healthcare Co-payments from Inmates (LB537)***

The Nebraska Department of Correctional Services would collect co-payments for prisoners receiving routine healthcare services under LB537. Sen. John Synowiecki of Omaha introduced the bill that would still allow prisoners access to healthcare regardless of their ability to pay. This bill is a carry over from the 2005 session.

- ***Health IT Bill Calls for ICD-10 by October 2009***

HR 4157 was introduced by Rep. Nancy Johnson (R-CT), Chair of the House Ways and Means Health Subcommittee, and contains provisions that could serve as initial building blocks to achieve a nationwide health information network. HR 4157, the Health Information Technology Promotion Act of 2005 (HITPA), along with a range of health information technology initiatives, the bill calls for the adoption and implementation

of ICD-10-CM and ICD-10-PCS as replacements for ICD-9-CM in the US by October 1, 2009.

AHIMA supports all of the components of this legislation which also includes:

- Codification of the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) that will make the office permanent, so that it will exist in HHS despite any administration change
- Establishment of duties for the ONC, including coordination of the development and maintenance of standards used in health information exchange
- "Safe harbors" under the Medicare Stark and anti-kickback legislation and regulation so that healthcare entities can assist each other in the development and adoption of a standard EHR and a nationwide health information network. This assistance would include training and education
- A study of various state privacy laws and transaction standards and their impact on the electronic exchange of information. If the HHS secretary makes proposals for uniform federal standards to overcome barriers in this regard and Congress does not act, the secretary will be empowered to create a uniform standard for privacy and security of health information
- A report on the activities of the newly created American Health Information Community
- Development of a strategic plan to coordinate implementation efforts for health information technology, HIPAA transaction standards, and coding standards
- The Advocacy Assistant tool (<https://secure.ahima.org/dc/aa/>) provides an easy way for AHIMA members to write their representatives asking for their support. The letter includes the following text:

"As a health information management professional and a member of the American Health Information Management Association (AHIMA), I strongly support this legislation and believe one of the most important and practical provisions contained in HR 4157 calls for the adoption

of ICD-10-CM and ICD-10-PCS by October 1, 2009.

Coded health data serves as the foundation for billing, claims processing, payment and pricing. The current classification system, ICD-9-CM, was developed and implemented in the 1970's and can no longer capture today's medical knowledge and cannot support the transition to an interoperable health data exchange in the United States. In addition, the procedural coding component of ICD-9-CM has less than 70 remaining unassigned codes and in the near future, will exhaust these codes requiring that existing non-discrete codes be assigned to new procedures. Furthermore, many of the codes now in use do not accurately describe the diagnosis or procedure concepts they are assigned to represent. Combined with the exhaustion of codes, this will have serious implications for quality reporting, research and appropriate payment for advancements in medical technology.

Technology alone will not solve the problems that our healthcare system faces. Technology combined with a robust 21st century classification system is essential, as we need to improve the quality of data in order to reap the full benefits of our investment in health information technology. This legislation makes that possible by requiring HHS to issue a final rule for the adoption of ICD-10-CM and ICD-10-PCS to reverse the trend of deteriorating health data and to allow the healthcare industry to prepare for a smooth transition to modern classification systems."

NHIMA ELECTION – Getting started...

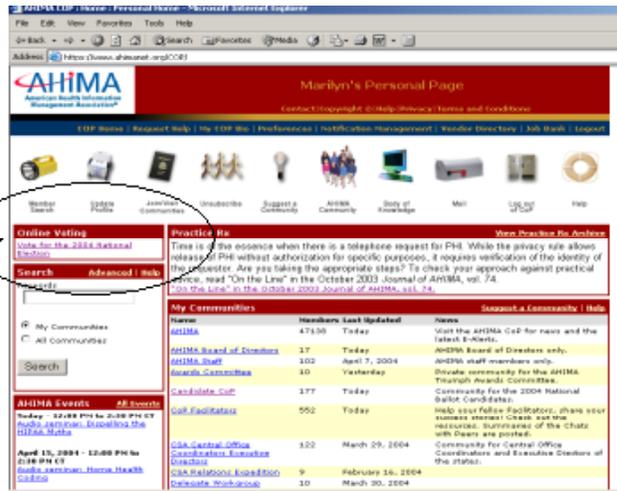
Log on to the Communities of Practice and locate the link entitled "Nebraska State Election" located in the top upper left hand corner your personal page in the CoP. The section is located right under the "Member Search," and Update Profile icons.

Eligible voters (Active, Senior, and Honorary AHIMA members holding a valid AHIMA credential as of March 21, 2006) can vote online.

The official voting period begins at 12 a.m. CST on March 22, 2006 and continues until 11:55 p.m. CST on April 11, 2006.

Click on the "Vote Now" button at the bottom of the page to go the ballot page. You will find the names of all the candidates and all the categories for voting. To view a candidate's bio and position statement, click on the name. When you are finished viewing the candidate's biography, click on the "x" in the top right corner to close the window. To vote for a candidate, click on the appropriate checkbox (circle) next to the candidate's name to vote for that person. For the positions of the President-elect, Secretary and Director, you will only be permitted to vote for "one" candidate. You may select no more than "three" candidates for the Nominating Committee positions. When you are finished, click the "Vote" button. The system will confirm your vote and take you back to your personal page. Please note, you can only vote once. If you do not vote for all positions, you cannot go back to vote on those positions.

Hospital Validation Case Submission – Is it a Priority for Your Department?

Each quarter, the Clinical Data Abstraction Center (CDAC) requests five randomly selected records from each hospital who has 6 or more cases accepted into the QIO Clinical Data Warehouse for validation. These records are re-abstracted by the CDAC for reliability scoring.

Hospital Health Information Management Departments are notified by CDAC 30 days before the record submission deadline of records that have been selected for validation. The notifications are sent via Federal Express and contain the selected case information, face sheets and the deadline to submit these records. The face sheet Project Abbreviation Number will end in the letter "V".

The CDAC will not accept records after the deadline. This means the hospital will automatically fail validation and has no grounds to appeal. Hospitals participating in the Annual Payment Update (APU) initiative could potentially have their reimbursement affected for failing validation.

Case Selections for validation are selected around the 25th of the month on a quarterly basis (March, April, September & December). Requests by the CDAC are sent out within the following five days. QNet Exchange Administrators have the capacity to view which cases have been selected by running a Case Selection Report even before the request is delivered.

January 2, 2006, was the most recent validation case submission deadline. Requests for records were sent to hospitals on December 2, 2005, notifying the hospital of which records from 2nd Quarter 2005 needed to be submitted by the January 2, 2006 deadline. The request was delivered via FedEx within four to five days. CIMRO of Nebraska staff reviewed the list of hospitals that had not submitted their validation records by December 27, 2005. As of that date, ten PPS hospitals and 10 Critical Access hospitals had not submitted the requested records. Although, the QIO is not responsible for notifying hospitals of records not received; CIMRO of Nebraska staff contacted the hospitals involved as a courtesy. In general, there was a great deal of confusion as to who received the request from the CDAC. Common responses given were "we never got the request", "what are you talking about?" and "the records have been copied for many days, we just need to send them", etc. Tracking information from CDAC showed the date, time and person signing for the records request and no Nebraska hospital failed to receive a CDAC request.

It's imperative that each hospital has a process in place for timely record submission. Quality Improvement staff and HIM personnel need to work together so the appropriate staff is aware of the records request, the importance of the submission deadline, and the date the records are submitted. We encourage hospitals to submit these records promptly and not wait until days before the deadline to send the records. The CDAC does not accept faxed copies of records. It is important to plan ahead to ensure the records are delivered on time.

This policy was revised to waive registrations for the President at the annual business meeting and to waive registrations for the chair and co-chair of the Conference Committee.

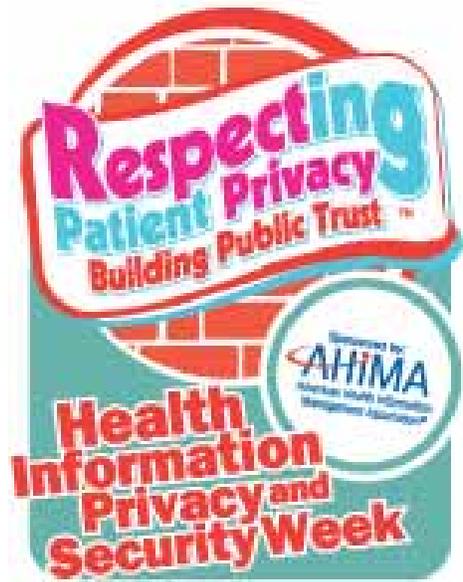
3.11 Annual NHIMA Business Meeting Standing Rules

News from the Health Information Management Program at Clarkson College
